
Pulsing with ANJA

Checking your traps 2 or 3 times a week can be a drag so we recommend Pulsing. This strikes a balance between maximum effectiveness and volunteer burnout. It can be nearly as effective as continuous control if carried out with high enough intensity and coordinated over a wide area.

We focus on four pulses each year: **A**ugust, **N**ovember, **J**anuary and **A**pril. Keeping our traps set in these four months each year is most effective based on rat and bird reproductive cycles.

Already pulsing? If your group is already pulsing, then now is the time to rally the troops for a few weeks of solid effort.

Not yet pulsing? If your group isn't currently pulsing but needs a shot in the arm, now is a great time to get in touch with your trapper database and get them to reset their traps and check them at least every second day through August. With the rat numbers suitably diminished, then we can all have a rest until January.



Maungawhau Ecological Halo comes to Mt Eden

Welcome to the <u>Maungawhau Ecological Halo</u>, a buffer zone around the maunga to protect and enhance the diversity of native bird life. Urban Ark – Manawa Taiao are working closely with the Mt Eden and Epsom communities, businesses and schools to trap, weed, plant strategically and generally enhance the native biodiversity around Mount Eden.

If you live in the area, you can collect a **free rat trap** and safety box from the new Urban Ark trap library at the Mt Eden Village Centre, open weekdays 9am–noon. They can lend you a free possum trap and also provide you with free resources to help identify invasive weeds on your property.

The keen team at the <u>Auckland Table Tennis Association</u> have set up a trapline on their border with the ecologically-significant Withiel–Thomas Reserve, and Urban Ark has helped the enviro group at Auckland Grammar school to set traps on school grounds. The latest organisation to come on board is <u>Eden Garden</u>, a key piece in the protective ring around the maunga.

Albert-Eden Grant Funds of between \$3000 and \$8000 are available for a range of projects including Community and Environment. Applications are open now and close on 27 August 2021. Projects can start after 1 November 2021. If you'd like help with your application, contact Paul Whitfield.

Waitemata Grants Applications are close on 6 August for their Local Grant (\$3000 - \$10,000), but there is more time to prepare for thier Quick Response Grant (\$300 - \$3000), which is open for applications 20 September to 15 October.



Calling all citizen scientists

Many of you will have taken part in the recent *NZ Garden Bird Survey*, counting birds in your garden or local park. That's a great example of citizen science in action, but we can all do more.

Counting birds is a fantastic way of doing your bit. Keeping track of what birds we see and making that information available for research helps gauge the effect on native biodiversity of all the trapping and planting work we do. We would love to see a lot more people using <u>eBird</u>.

You don't need a cammo jacket and spotting scope to take part. Urban Ark coordinator, Paul Whitfield, now has a reasonable knowledge of NZ birds, but 18 months ago he could barely tell a starling from a blackbird. Join Paul for an hour-long workshop on how to get started, logging your first checklist and contributing to the NZ Bird Atlas, a five-year survey of Aotearoa's avifauna.
