Effective Communication with Cat Companions

Sandringham Spring Festival



Gear up for the November Predator Pulse

Now is a great time to make sure you and your group have everything ready for the November pulse. The aim is to really knock the rat and possum numbers down this month so that they don't rebound too much before our next pulse in late January.

Having trouble bagging that predator? Yep, we know it can be frustrating when you set your trap week after week, top up the peanut butter (which always gets eaten by invertebrates) and never catch anything. And chew cards, or trail cam footage tell you there are rats about.

The fact is, rats (and possums and especially stoats) don't always enter traps. If they did, our job would be easy. But there are things you can do to improve your odds:

Switch up your lure Maybe your rat prefers liquorice to peanut butter, or even white chocolate buttons. Try a new lure.

Relocate Try placing your trap next to the compost bin, on top of a fence or in some hidden spot. **Spring clean** Make sure your trap is working sweetly. Wipe it down and make sure all mechanisms operate easily. It would be a shame not to catch something due to old peanut butter stuck in your springs. Now is a perfect time for spring cleaning.

Are your rats sensitive The Victor Pro traps used by most Urban Ark groups can be set to 'Sensitive' (see manufacturers <u>video</u>) so the trap goes off at the slightest touch. You just need to watch your fingers as you can set off the trap easily as well, and it's far from a pleasant sensation getting your fingers caught in a Victor.



Predator Control Training

Conservation Volunteers NZ are running a couple of their Predator Control Training sessions for new volunteers. The course is pretty much a pre-requisite for those intending to trap in Council reserves and parks. The sessions are free and give you a great grouding in staying safe as you trap. Training is on **Sunday 22 November 2020** at these times and places:
